This interaction represents a vital opportunity for the Council to gain a deeper understanding of the communities it serves through its research efforts. The Council commends Principal Dr. Ryan Reardon for his dedicated leadership and commitment to fostering equity in education and uplifting all students, regardless of their background. Dr. Reardon's profound work in ensuring equitable opportunities has been instrumental in enhancing local communities and inspiring future generations. The Council also wants to highlight the school's faculty and staff for their commitment and dedication to serving our students and ensuring their safety and educational foundation for future sustainability.

The following day, on January 18<sup>th</sup>, 2025, Council members will attend the 5000 Role Models of Excellence 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Scholarship Breakfast at the Miami



Beach Convention Center. This profound event celebrates the legacy of Dr. King by supporting educational opportunities for our deserving Black male population. As part of the program, Council members will be inducted as role models into the 5000 Role Models of Excellence Project by Congresswoman Frederica Wilson, further cementing their commitment to mentorship and leadership for young Black males across the state.
